

Graduates, parents, family members, TLCI advisors and professionals. I'm Manfred Smith, TLCI Principal Director: Welcome to the 2023 graduation celebration honoring our accomplished young men and women!

Our mission is to provide every student the opportunity to become a full partner in their educational journey by encouraging and guiding them to discover hidden talents, interests, and for many, rekindling their motivation to learn and the excitement that accompanies success in achieving their goals.

This process of learner empowerment—to become more confident and make wise choices for one's success—is the engine that powers the accomplishments of our learners and graduates for over 40 years because it best prepares them for

I was born in Germany shortly after the war. The apartment my family lived in was one of the few buildings not destroyed during the war. There was electricity and running water, but no central heating, or gas to cook our food. That was done on a coal stove. Every so often, I would go to the basement to bring up a bag of coal. Two coal stoves warmed the apartment, but none in the bedrooms, which were bitter cold in the winter. Thick down covers kept us warm throughout the night. We had an ice box; emphasis on ICE. Block of ice kept the food cool. No TV, record players, phone, or a car, but we did have one radio. And no bathroom. The common toilet was two stories up and it did not flush.

You, our 2023 graduates, are matriculating into a world that has a thousand times more material goods, conveniences, and opportunities than I had when I graduated from high school. You will also face the challenges of rapid, ongoing change that was much slower when I graduated.

To effectively manage the challenges that will confront you, requires that you continue to practice and improve the critical self-empowerment skills you developed as a TLCI student:

- Self-reflection —to think deeply and systematically about one's learning and goals.
- Self-evaluation-to assess one's progress, successes, and failures.
- Self-correction—to identify negative outcomes and create a plan of action to correct or eliminate problems.

Whatever the path you have chosen, I encourage you to make the hard choices in your journey through life that will result in the success and happiness you will deserve—because in the end, you will not regret having made your own choices, nor will you regret the great things you have done, but you will regret the choices and opportunities you let slip by.

While I wanted to go to public school, the way TLCI is organized helped me with my last years of school.



The Learning Community International provided a freedom to choose my own study areas like colleges do. Freedom comes with responsibility. Therefore, TLCI giving freedom to students to delve into their passionate study area is an amazing way for me to not only learn academic study but also become a responsible and independent individual.

I became more composed and happy. Being able to concentrate on subjects that I am passionate about such as visual art and art history allowed me to enjoy learning and getting back to a steady ground in life.

I have been in TLCI since kindergarten.



sealed the deal. For the next few months, my life underwent massive changes, such as spending nearly a whole year in South America and starting home-schooling with TLCI.


